If needed, a nursery is available down the hall past the restrooms. The restrooms contain changing tables, as needed.

Throughout the service, members of Zion's music ministry offer their talents as an offering to God. Please receive their musical gifts as a time for prayer, contemplation, or praise of God rather than a performance to be applauded, so that we may worship God throughout our time here together.

GREEN SEASON

The Sundays following Pentecost take us through the summer months and into the fall. These many months take us through many of the stories during the ministry of Jesus. We will also spend a significant portion of the Green Season hearing portions of Paul's letter to the Roman church. The purpose of these readings is to encourage us to grow in our faith in Christ like the growth of a green plant - little by little, each day.


OFFERING PRAYER







Pastor's Reflection

Pastor Kathi Johnson

"Just take it one step at a time." How many times in my life have I heard this? How many times in my ministry have I said it? This idea - one step at a time can be so helpful in times of worry or stress, in times when healing is needed, or when facing a particular challenge. "Just take it one step at a time."

Jesus says it this way: "Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." (Matthew 6:34) And there are times when I think, "That's great advice, Jesus, but have you seen my to-do list lately?"

But, as it turns out, taking things one step or one day at a time is how we operate best. When we focus on that one day - the one that's here and now - we can be truly present. Whether it's family or our jobs or school work or time with friends or time with God, when we focus on the here and now, we can be present to whatever or whomever is with us.

And then...things really happen. Our relationships begin to deepen. Our inner lives grow. We have the ability to think more clearly and understand more easily as our minds are less cluttered with "what ifs" and "what abouts." We can pray. We can breathe.

Try it this week, if you can. Focus on one day - one step - at a time. See how it goes.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When is a time you feel you were treated unfairly?
- How would you describe God's generosity? Give an example.

DEVOTIONS 🔌

Read: Matthew 20:1-16.

Fairness is in the eyes of the beholder. Most of us have experienced a time when we felt we were treated unfairly. It gets all the more frustrating when the sense of fairness is decided by God's grace. Who or what we see that should be last, may end up being first and a privileged recipient of God's generosity. There are times when the apparent unfairness of this parable can sound like good news when we are hurting, needing any help we can get, and can only take what is offered. This parable points to what God offers us—grace upon grace—something that is so much more than we deserve. As a result, our lives are able to respond with overwhelming gratitude. If gratitude is not our response to Jesus' parable, it may lead us to the observation that our sense of being first has missed the point; we may need to review the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-13) for God's sense of fairness and living rightly before God. *Discuss:* When have you experienced God's generosity? How did you respond? *Pray:* God of justice and mercy, help us to see as you see and to live with compassion for all

and with gratitude for what we receive through Jesus Christ our Savior and Lord. Amen.

SERVICE

Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings for this week, how can you show an act of undeserved kindness to someone this week?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Psalm 145:4 tells us: "One generation shall extol your works to another and shall declare your mighty acts." Think or talk about people from older or younger generations who have shown and taught you about God's love and generosity through Jesus. Consider drawing a picture, writing a note, or calling them to say thank you. As a reminder of God's generosity, prayerfully recite: "The Lord is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love." (Psalm 145:8)
