Throughout the service, members of Zion's music ministry offer their talents as an offering to God. Please receive their musical gifts as a time for prayer, contemplation, or praise of God rather than a performance to be applauded, so that we may worship God throughout our time here together.

For four weeks each October, we take time as a congregation to focus on Generosity. This year, we are specifically thinking about how our financial generosity to our congregation enables us to be a place of loving welcome. 
FIRST READING: EXODUS 17:1-7




OFFERING PRAYER





PASTOR'S REFLECTION

This weekend, we begin our annual focus on Generosity. I mentioned that topic in my sermon last Sunday as I talked about the generosity of God to us. I talked about how God is generous to us - to all of us - with God's love and mercy. And sometimes God's generosity doesn't make sense to us, but that's OK because it doesn't have to.

What can we learn from God's generosity to us? Psalm 25 reminds us that God shows compassionate love to us. Matthew 11 reminds us that Jesus welcomes the weary. There are other examples from Scripture that we will look at in the weeks to come, too. But part of what we can learn from God about Generosity is what I said on Sunday: that the point of generosity is to show love and to show grace.

This year as we focus on Generosity, we are going to think through some of the ways that our Generosity enables Zion to be a place of welcome. Beyond being a place of welcome, however, God calls us to be a welcoming people. In how we think about others, in how we speak about others, and in how we greet others - we are called to be loving and welcoming.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When is a time you questioned someone's actions in government, school, or other organization?
- How does Jesus' leadership differ from other leaders?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 21:23-32.

The chief priests and elders are intended to be leaders of the Jewish people. Jesus challenges their authority and leadership by wanting them to make a commitment—pro or con regarding John the Baptist. They are not able to do that because they do not truly represent the people who supported John. These leaders are actually servants of Rome, the occupation force in Judea. Their wealth and power are at the pleasure of Rome, not the people of Judea. The leaders have a difficult task to balance between worshiping God and an allegiance to Rome. It is reminiscent of Jesus saying that one cannot serve two masters (Matthew 6:24). The authority Jesus serves is only God's kingdom. In words and actions, Jesus is the obedient Son who triumphs over all other authorities on earth. It is an obedience that will lead to Jesus' death at the hands of those loyal to Rome but will bring hope for all people burdened by powers of fear and death.

Discuss: How does Jesus' authority and obedience to serve only God's kingdom make a difference for all people?

Pray: Almighty God, we thank you for Jesus' obedience to your power of grace and mercy so that sinners and tax collectors enter into your kingdom through Christ our Lord. Amen.



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings for this week, how can you help someone who feels weighed down by the burdens of life?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Philippians 2:3 says, "Do nothing from selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves." Name this "Humility Week" in your household. Secretly decide on one act of service you (and others) can perform that will show concern for the interests of others. If you live alone, find someone outside your home to do this with. At the end of the week, think or talk about your acts of "secret service" and what it felt like to show concern for others.
