

WELCOME TO ZION

When we gather for worship, we're receptive to God's word and we rejoice in God's grace through song, prayer, and Holy Communion. The history of Christian worship is rich with rituals formed by generations. These traditions, prayers, and pastoral teachings help connect our lives with Christ. HOW WE WORSHIP

The Holy Spirit gathers people around the means of grace: the Word of God and the Sacraments. From the table of Holy Communion where Christ comes with forgiveness, life, and salvation, God sends us out to share the good news and care for those in need. Our worship follows this pattern in four parts: Gathering, Word, Meal, and Sending. By its very nature, Lutheran worship is participatory and the service is contained within this bulletin. Worship leaders guide us through the service and our responses are printed in **bold type.**

We welcome children in our worship services! If needed, a nursery is available down the hallway past the restrooms. The restrooms contain changing tables, as needed.

Throughout the service, members of Zion's music ministry offer their talents as an offering to God. Please receive their musical gifts as a time for prayer, contemplation, or praise of God rather than a performance to be applauded, so that we may worship God throughout our time here together.

WORSHIP IN NOVEMBER

As we wind down the Church Year for 2023, we jump from our last true "Green Season" Sunday on November 12 to Zion's annual Sunday of Giving Thanks on November 19. Each year on the Sunday before the Thanksgiving holiday, we as a congregation also take time to focus on giving thanks to God. Then, on the last Sunday of the month (November 26), the Church Year finishes with Christ the King Sunday: "Acknowledging Christ as our merciful ruler, we go forth that his reign may be known in our loving words and deeds" (Sundays & Seasons).


FIRST READING: DEUTERONOMY 8:7-18

He made water flow for you from flint rock, ¹⁶ and fed you in the wilderness with manna that your ancestors did not know, to humble you and to test you, and in the end to do you good. ¹⁷Do not say to yourself, "My power and the might of my own hand have gotten me this wealth." ¹⁸But remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors, as he is doing today.

"He scatters abroad, he gives to the poor;


his righteousness endures forever."


Lift up your hearts.

Come, Holy Spirit.

With your holy ones of all times and places, with the earth and all its creatures, with sun and moon and stars, we praise you, O God, blessed and holy Trinity, now and forever.



Thankoffering History

Beginning in the late

19th century, Lutheran women were given small Thankoffering boxes to place in a special location in their homes as a visible reminder of blessings received. Women would add coins to those boxes almost daily as particular blessings were noted. From their use came the idea of an annual church service to celebrate their collection, and so the women of the congregation would come together for a Thankoffering service. The concept of Thankoffering celebrations dates back more than 100 years and beyond Lutherans. The Episcopal Church Women held their first recorded Thankoffering service in 1889, and the World Thankoffering service of the United Methodist Women has been a tradition for over 100 years. In the Lutheran tradition, the General Synod's Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society created their first Thankoffering service in 1889 to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the organization. At that first Thankoffering, \$6,100 was collected. Today, Women of the ELCA collects more than \$1 million in Thankofferings annually for the ministries and mission of our women's organization.



DEVOTIONS



Read: Deuteronomy 8:7-18.

The history of thanksgiving is at least as old as the Bible. Deuteronomy records what a biblical thanksgiving looks like. First, it is filled with wonder and delight at God's goodness for bringing people out of despair and into a fruitful and well-watered land. It is a land—like our own country—of plenty that provides all we need to live in peace. The crucial ingredient to biblical thanksgiving is to remember the source of that plenty. This is done by living according to God's teachings that promise peace and contentment for all. The challenge is that we forget. We are guilty of exulting ourselves at times by thinking that the blessings of life are due to the "power and the might of my own hand" (v. 17). Woven in this text is a call to remember and to repent of our forgetfulness. We give thanks as we turn away from self-satisfaction and to the goodness of God, the source of all blessings, who promises peace and contentment for all. Discuss: What blessings and benefits do you want to remember as you give thanks for what God provides us?

Pray: God of the abundant harvest, your creation gives us more than we need. Give us hearts that are thankful, satisfied, and ready to share your plenty and goodness in Christ. Amen.





Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings for this day, how can you share God's abundance with others?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



One of the lepers, a Samaritan, returned to Jesus to give thanks for his healing (Luke 17:16). Today is a day to embrace the opportunity for us to give thanks for God's goodness in our lives. After the Thanksgiving meal, gather in a space where you can toss a ball or another item to one another making sure each person has a chance to catch the item. The person who catches the item tells what they are thankful for. After everyone has had a turn, close with this blessing: May God bless you with a generous and thankful heart now and always.
