ADVENT LESSONS AND CAROLS

Services of Lessons and Carols began in England late in the 19th Century. Prior to this, carols were mostly secular songs and were sung in people's homes around Christmas time. Beginning in 1875, church musicians and clergy in England began to introduce carols into worship services, and in 1880, a Service of Nine Lessons and Carols was first held on Christmas Eve in Truro Cathedral (in southwest England).

Our tradition at Zion is to hold a Service of Lessons and Carols on the First Sunday of Christmas, which we will do this year on December 31. This year, however, we decided also to include Advent Lessons and Carols to our celebration of this season. We've included here five lessons from the Hebrew Scriptures - lessons which show us God's promise of reconciliation through Jesus Christ. Our final lesson, from Luke, is the story of Mary receiving the news that she will bear the Son of the Most High.

In this service, sometimes we sing, sometimes we listen. Through the alternating readings and music, the grace of God shines forth for us.

A couple more pieces have joined our nativity scene this week: a shepherd and sheep. The Prince of Peace wasn't born in a big palace, surrounded by riches. The presence of animals in our nativity reminds us that Christ was born humbly, in a stable.

In present-day Bethlehem we find the Church of the Nativity, a 6th Century basilica which has been much-modified in the years since it was built. To reach the Grotto of the Nativity, you descend stone steps which have been worn down by centuries of pilgrims visiting the site believed to be the birth-place of Jesus. In this underground grotto, we realize that Jesus was quite possibly born in a cave. Humble beginnings, indeed.

The presence of shepherds in our nativity underscores Christ's humble beginnings, for shepherds were considered the lowest of the low on the social ladder. That God would send angels to shepherds in order to announce the birth of Jesus is a sign of God's love for all.

DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 1:1-8.

The first line in Mark, "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God," serves as a title for the entire gospel writing. That title and that announcement of good news is the source of all the peace we can want. Mark's Gospel does not present a peace that is simply life without struggles. The peace of God that comes with the good news of Jesus involves struggle, cleansing, and letting go of one's own innocence or purity. The peace that Jesus brings, and John the Baptist introduces, involves a "repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (v. 4). The peace that Jesus brings—and continues to bring throughout our lives—is the freeing power to let go of an understanding of being able to make it on one's own or of being better than others. Worship services often begin with statements of confession and forgiveness. This offers a peace where we need not hide from the hurts and brokenness of our lives and world. It is the peace that rests on the goodness of God in Christ for us and for all.

Discuss: How does confession and forgiveness give you peace?

Pray: God of steadfast love and faithfulness, we thank you for coming to us again and again that we may know your forgiving power and have peace through Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Amen.

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you extend the peace of God to someone?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



The scripture readings during Advent point to Jesus. This week we light two candles on the Advent wreath. The second candle is the candle of peace. Think or talk about how the words of Psalm 85, a prayer for restoration, bring us peace: "Let me hear what God the LORD will speak, for he will speak peace to his people, to his faithful, to those who turn to him in their hearts." Light the first candle of hope and the second candle of peace and say: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5)
